Letter from the Board Chairperson



As we look back on the year 2018, I would like to review the year 2014. Why you ask? Well, it was then that teams comprising of City employees, Hamilton Community Foundation members and interested citizens made two trips to witness how other municipalities operate their park systems... specifically, Louisville, Kentucky and Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Joshua Smith, Tim Werdman and Steve Timmer visited with folks at the Olmstead Parks Conservancy in Louisville. While there, they viewed the five parks managed by this organization and got a better understanding of their operations, funding, staffing, etc. While certainly helpful, the relatively small operation created additional questions from this group. Later in the year, Joshua Smith, Thomas Vanderhorst, Kathy Klink, John Guidugli, and Steve Timmer visited the Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy. In this situation, the City of Pittsburgh managed some parks while the Conservancy managed others. Again, while helpful, these two systems did not portray the vision created by these individuals. After numerous meetings with City Staff, attorneys, the Hamilton Community Foundation and some of our present Board, our first official meeting of the Hamilton Parks Conservancy, a not for profit organization, occurred on November 18, 2014. Four of our current Board members made up the first meeting. As of the writing of the 2018 Annual report, we are one of the few Parks Conservancies that operate 100% of the park land in their respective communities. As a Board, we do not take this task lightly.

2019 will be another eventful and exciting year for the Hamilton Parks Conservancy. We began constructing Jefferson Park in 2018 on East Avenue as a result of numerous donations including the donation of the land by Frank and JoAnn Pfirmann. This park will be completed during the Spring of 2019. We are going to research and plan the construction of Pickleball Courts in a centrally located area of the City. An additional nine holes will be constructed at the Millikin Woods Disc Golf Course. We will work with Leadership Hamilton Class 27 and the Hamilton Conservation Corps to recreate the Cliffview Natural Area. The Arts in Our Parks program will continue with a mural painted on the new Nature Center at Joyce Park. We will develop a plan for the renovation of the Historic Joyce Park Home. Finally, we will continue a high level of maintenance in our parks and continue our proactive maintenance program for our park buildings and assets.

Our organization continues to seek out and work with local companies and contractors whenever possible. Playground Equipment Services and Al-Joe's Pet & Garden Centers, Inc. have also provided in kind contributions to us during the year. Thank you!

As a community, we are extremely fortunate to have donors and a staff that believe in the mission of the Hamilton Parks Conservancy. I believe that our citizens are reaping the benefits of the creation of this organization. A sincere thank you on behalf of your Board of Directors!

Director's Report for 2018



It's hard to believe that The Hamilton Parks Conservancy has just completed our fourth year of managing, maintaining and providing capital investment to Hamilton's park system. In 2018, we went to the neighborhoods. The Hamilton Parks Conservancy replaced eleven playgrounds and swing sets in our neighborhood parks in 2018. Add these to the seven playgrounds

we replaced in our first three years, and we now have eighteen new playgrounds in the City of Hamilton. We plan on replacing at least one more in 2019. This could not have happened without the generosity of our citizens, service organizations, and the Hamilton Community Foundation.

A unique opportunity arose in 2018. The Conservancy was contacted to see if we could construct a park in the Jefferson neighborhood (4th Ward). This is one of the few areas in our city without a park. The Frank Pfirman Family offered to donate the land and start-up funding. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Thomas contacted us and offered \$20,000.00, Mr. and Mrs. John A. Whalen added \$15,000.00, Kathleen Klink added \$10,000.00, and The Hamilton Parks Conservancy is appropriating \$25,000.00 from our capital budget. We will also utilize funds from "The Friends of the Parks Fund" at the Hamilton Community Foundation. The Parks Conservancy plans on opening Jefferson Park before the school year ends. The new park is located at East Avenue and Hensley Avenue next to the Boys and Girls Club.

Some great news in 2018! The American Planning Association named RiversEdge at Marcum Park "One of the Five Great Spaces in America" for 2018. Thanks once again to the Marcum Family.

I would like to thank The Hamilton Parks Conservancy's Board of Trustees for their time and assistance and dedication to the improvement of Hamilton's Park System. Thanks also to our donors and the Hamilton Community Foundation for their continued financial support, and to Adam Helms and his crew for a great concert series, the many city departments for their support in 2018, and City Manager Joshua Smith, Mayor Patrick Moeller and City Council for their support and confidence.

I would be remiss without thanking our team who work tirelessly to provide Hamilton's citizens with a park system that is getting better and better with each passing year. The management provided by Jon Cook, our Park Maintenance Superintendent and Audrey Baker, the Office Manager, makes my job so much easier. Special thanks go to Jeff Jones, our CPO, who worked almost every weekend during the summer making sure our Spraygrounds were properly operating, Lisa Scrimizzi-Jones for her dedication to making Colligan Lodge the beautiful venue it is, and of course Janis Overholser for taking our planting beds to a new level.

On a sad note, we lost Ron Maxwell, our Joyce Park Caretaker, in September. He was not only great for our park system but also a wonderful man. It doesn't seem the same at Joyce Park without him. He is sadly missed.

The year 2018 was also one of continued improvements.

- The interactive water sculpture was installed at Marcum Park.
- The little river at Marcum Park received upgrades and improvements.
- Marcum Park signs were added at two locations.
- A sign was added to Rotary Park.
- Six park shelters were re-roofed, painted and reinforced.
- The Beckett Lodge (the Joyce Park log cabin) was upgraded and will be available for parties in the spring of 2019.
- Remodeling of the Joe Nuxhall Driving Range building was started, and it will become a Nature Center.
- Our "Arts in the Parks" program continued with four murals and a sculpture. The murals theme in 2018 was insects. One mural is at Joyce Park, one at Benninghofen Park, one at Booker T. Washington Splash Pad, and the final one is at Millikin Woods. The "Live Your Dreams" sculpture by Dale Rogers is appropriately placed at Joyce Park where many children are playing sports. The Hamilton Parks Conservancy's "Arts in the Parks" program is funded entirely through private donations.

Yoga is now provided at the Hamilton Flea! The Hamilton Flea takes place on the 2nd Saturday of the month during the months of May, June, July, August, and September.





Southerland Park


